### Presentation

Margaret introduced Roberta who presented Wheat Weaving

## History

Roberta began with a short History of Wheat Weaving

In ancient times the farmers believed that there was a spirit and it resided in the last sheaf of wheat. The wheat was woven and kept on the hearth. The next spring the wheat weaving was taken to the fields and planted thus restoring the spirit for the next harvest.

Love knots were another feature and were required to be woven by the prospective bride and groom. If the love knot was completed it was considered that they were *compatible* and should be married.

# Learning Wheat Weaving

Roberta learned wheat weaving from Bonnie after a show. Bonnie drove in a beat up Toyota from California to Vermont where Roberta was teaching. At the end of the week Roberta spent Saturday learning wheat weaving from Bonnie



After that Roberta found a book in 1996 on wheat weaving and was able to learn the techniques from the book. The book included step by step instructions. After exhausting that book, Roberta was able to move to less well documented structures.

#### Items

- Welsh Fan combined to make a star.
- Welsh harp is then combined to make sea horses. A friend from Ireland stated that the image is on stone carvings.

### Demonstration

Roberta continued the presentation showing items woven with wheat as well as reeds. On show piece that decorated the table was a *spiral woven decoration which was 55*" *long taking 1000 pieces of wheat.* Spiral weave is an old English technique. Spiral hollow weave followed from the basic spiral weave.

#### Sources

Roberta now buys wheat from North Carolina, black bearded Durham wheat. Originally Roberta used wheat from Newbury farm. Now Roberta orders a 50lb box at a cost around \$250.

#### **Process**

Roberta then demonstrated the process:

- Sort by size typically winding up with 4 types
- Place wheat in a window box and fill with hot water. Daffodil weaving uses a similar technique.
- Need to keep it wet but not too long otherwise it will grow mould.
- Need wheat that is flexible and the knee is low on the stem
- Use waxed thread
- "Four directions weave" to generate a square
- "Corn Husk Dolls"
- Stretch the weaving to overcome the problem of the stems thickening at the end
- Knotted to make a love knot
- Drying between paper bags weighted with books.

#### Q. Joining?

A. Has to remain wet, keep the pieces under a damp towel

Q. What happens on a break?


A. Cut at the fold and weave in a new straw.

Q. Any beads

A. Yes

Q. Straw Hats

A. Typical straw hat flat weave and then sewn together



A. Not sure but doubt that it is machine weaveable



Q. When did you start

A. 1996, did take 3 years off due to burn out.

# Table Cloth Project

This is a group project to dress our table at NEWs and other events. Martha, Melissa and Betsy agreed to lead the project. The team have decided to use 5/2 mercerised cotton and to use the colours from the NoBo logo. Each weaver can decide the weave structure but need to use the choosen colours. Piece needs to be 110" long unfinished. Need to wet finish all pieces together. When the weaver has finished stitch ends only, no other finishing necessary.

Members interested in contributing should planning their contribution to the project. Time line:

- Get yarn requirements by August 1<sup>st</sup>
- Yarn will be delivered at the September meeting.
- Pieces are to be ready by February.
- Please provide the name, width of loom and shafts.
- It would be helpful to have a sample for the project leads.

- An email will be sent out with commitment by the June meeting.
- Summary:

  - February completed item
  - April Tablecloth complete

Betsy will bring the full set of colours to the June meeting.
